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March is Women's History Month!



About Women's History Month

Women's History Month had its origins as a national celebration in 1981 when Congress passed Pub. L. 97-28 which authorized and requested the President to proclaim the week beginning March 7, 1982, as "Women's History Week." Throughout the next five years, Congress continued to pass joint resolutions designating a week in March as "Women's History Week." In 1987 after being petitioned by the National Women's History Project, Congress passed Pub. L. 100-9 which designated the month of March 1987 as "Women's History Month." Between 1988 and 1994, Congress passed additional resolutions requesting and authorizing the President to proclaim March of each year as Women's History Month. Since 1995, Presidents Clinton, Bush, and Obama have issued a series of annual proclamations designating the month of March as "Women's History Month."

Mrs. Fields has incredible influence on literary decisions at Ticknor and Fields Publishing House and a great ear for gossip! Counting Nathaniel Hawthorne, Oliver Wendell Holmes, and Henry Wadsworth Longfellow amongst her closest friends, she witnessed a great deal of Victorian revelry at her waterside museum in Beacon Hill. No short of a Gossip Girl, Mrs. Fields wrote about her guests' embarrassing moments in her novel *Authors and Friends* and shares them with you during an intimate teatime conversation.

Join Mrs. Fields, as she hosts you and your guests for an afternoon tea. There will be cookies, laughter and disbelief, and even some blushing cheeks, when you hear the tantalizing tales of the Victorian Gossip Girl! Carson is considered the mother of the environmental movement. A writer and biologist, she touched off an international controversy about the environmental effects of pesticides with her 1962 book, The Silent Spring.
